Those interested in a compilation of some of Don Heinrich Tolzmann's writings may be interested in *German-Americana: Selected Essays* (Little Miami Publishing Company, 2009). It contains thirty-seven of Tolzmann's essays, articles, and reviews, some of which previously appeared in *GL*, others of which have appeared elsewhere, or were previously unpublished. Topics range from German heritage places, such as Cincinnati, Ohio; northern Kentucky; Hermann, Missouri; and New Ulm, Minnesota; to persons, such as Goethe, H.L. Mencken, John A. Roebling, and John Kay of Steppenwolf. General topics, such as the history of German immigration and settlement, German contributions to America, four hundred years of Germans in America, and the 325th anniversary of Germantown are also covered, making this a cornucopia of German-Americana for all those interested in exploring America's German heritage and its meaning for today. Jerry Glenn notes in the Foreword: "A unifying thread in many of the pieces is a personal touch," with information "about the author's associations" to the topics covered. In short, this is a collection presenting a cross-section of the author's writings on German-Americana, with an autobiographical dimension to the collection as a whole. **GL**
